

Musicalischer Circul Austral Harmony on historical instruments

Musicalischer Circul

From the Inner Circle of Johann Sebastian Bach, focusing attention on his pupils, close associates and copyists. Music by Gottfried Homilius, Johann Ludwig Krebs, Johann Philipp Kirnberger and his estimable son Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach, all significant figures in the preservation of J S Bach's musical legacy.

Austral Harmony takes its name from an early collection of Australian poetry, and is an ensemble of Australian musicians who specialise in playing music of the 18th century fostering a particular interest in the works of J S Bach. Using historical instruments they present innovatively designed programmes and promote less familiar repertoire.

Austral Harmony has performed at Melba Hall, Trinity College Melbourne, the New England Bach Festival, St James' Church Sydney, for National Conferences with the Australasian Double Reed Society and Adelaide Baroque. Regular recitals at the Wesley Music Centre in Canberra help raise funds for an Early Music Scholarship. Future engagements include a tour of rural Victoria, NSW & Queensland with masterclasses and lectures featuring the oboe da caccia, performances for the Australian Bach Society, The Little Music Room, and a European tour. Their CD "Harmonische Freude" is due for imminent release.

"You have to make music from the soul, not like a trained bird." – 300th Anniversary of Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach

Johann Sebastian Bach's second eldest son, *Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach* (1714 – 1788), belongs to the most important composers of the 18th century. Although his father is better known today, C. P. E. Bach enjoyed much greater acclaim during his lifetime. His extensive body of work experienced great appreciation and an unusually large distribution. He was a crucial influence to Joseph Haydn, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart and Ludwig van Beethoven.

Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach died aged 74 in Hamburg. His works and his musical stance – as presented in the *Essay on the True Art of Playing Keyboard Instruments* – make him the most significant representative of the period of transition between the Late Baroque and the Classical. He – and his many students in Frankfurt, Berlin and Hamburg – effectively formed the ensuing generations more than we are aware of today.
