Our 2012-2013 Silver Anniversary Season was a tremendous success. The highlight was undoubtedly our Silver Anniversary Celebration Concert on March 3, 2013, at Chizuk Amuno Congregation, featuring an inspiring performance of Beethoven's 9th Symphony. With over 1,100 in attendance, this was a true celebration of brotherhood and an affirmation of how far Bach In Baltimore has come over the past 25 years.

In our 26th Season, we promise to continue bringing you the finest quality performances possible. ### T. HERBERT DIMMOCK

Tim Smith of *The Baltimore Sun* wrote: "Since 1977, no one has had his finger more clearly on the pulse of choral music in Baltimore than T. Herbert Dimmock."


Mr. Dimmock is considered one of the foremost Baroque experts in the country. His conducting credits include nearly all the oratorios and anthems of Handel, all the major Bach works and approximately 140 Bach Cantatas. He has conducted the music of Bach in the US, Germany, Canada and England, working with many of the world's most accomplished singers and instrumentalists. His unique performances of Bach's music are the result of a life-long study of Bach, Bach's music, and Bach's theology. Maestro Dimmock has also thoroughly explored the music of Handel. As music director of the Handel Choir of Baltimore for 25 years, he conducted 14 of his oratorios and all of his major anthems (including the Chandos Anthems, the Te Deums, the Coronation Anthems, the Funeral Anthem, and the Foundling Hospital Anthem).

Maestro Dimmock is an accomplished organist having played organ recitals at many of the world's most prestigious sites, including Westminster Abbey, Winchester Cathedral, the National Cathedral, and the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City. A graduate of Davidson College and Peabody Conservatory, Mr. Dimmock pursued further study with Greg Smith, Roger Wagner, Robert Shaw, and Helmuth Rilling in the US and abroad. Currently, he serves as music director of St. Stephen's Episcopal Cathedral in Harrisburg, PA. There he directs the cathedral choir, plays the organ and is building a new concert series.



Maestro Dimmock has received numerous awards and recognitions over the years, including Who's Who, International Biographical Society, Baltimore's Best, and Citations of Appreciation from Mayor & City Council of Baltimore, State of Maryland, Senate of Maryland, Baltimore County Schools and Baltimore City Schools.

Maestro Dimmock is also the choir director of what is arguably the premier Jewish Choir at a Conservative Synagogue in the USA, the Chizuk Amuno Congregation. Working with the cantor of the synagogue, Mr. Dimmock has recorded an acclaimed CD of Jewish music entitled "Face to Face."

For over 300 years, the music of Johann Sebastian Bach has touched and moved millions and millions of people. In the January 21, 2011 edition of the New York Times Anthony Tommasini wrote that having collected over 1,500 comments, polling countless musicians and music lovers and drawing on a lifetime of music study and criticism he concluded that, beyond a doubt, J. S. Bach was the greatest composer of all time. The writing of cantatas (which Bach called 'Stücke' ["pieces"]) comprised the bulk of his creative energies over his lifetime. It is more than fitting that Bach in Baltimore chooses to devote itself to both the performance and the understanding of these magnificent musical gems.

Most people have had the good fortune to have learned about music in a variety of ways: through the study of a musical instrument, singing in a school or church/synagogue choir, and/ or music appreciation courses in college. While all of these vehicles afford a terrific way to learn about music, they all tend to focus on the necessity for the next upcoming performance – or simply learning about historical facts, musical forms, dates of composers and compositions, and where the music fits into the larger picture of world history. These approaches – valuable as they are – omit another dimension, just below the musical surface, which offers immense returns to those who look for it.

Of course, it is quite rewarding to listen to the music of Johann Sebastian Bach and appreciate it for its inventive melodies, captivating forms, and imaginative use of rhythms. However, to stop there is to miss the tremendously developed and immeasurably rewarding subjective aspect of Bach's music. To stop there would be like reading a great novel without any understanding of metaphor, simile or descriptive devices: the story would still be present, but the richness of the author's descriptions would be overlooked.

The form Bach derived from his sacred texts motivated him to produce an intensely personal music which was designed to elicit an emotional response from his audience. In his magnificent book, The Cantatas of J. S. Bach, Alfred Dürr notes: "Artistic peaks generally owe their origins to a happy concurrence of various contributory factors. Hence a variety of causes may be adduced for the cultivation of the Protestant church cantata. Perhaps the most important of these is the theology of Martin Luther. The conviction that God's Word, as laid down in the Bible, is dead and ineffectual unless it is proclaimed, that everything depends on making it current, increasingly resulted in a new orientation of church music. A close link between words and melody is already found in Luther's own hymns, and in liturgical singing – increasingly in the vernacular rather than in Latin.... German composers sought a declamation of the sung word that was no longer merely correct but animated and impassioned."

As the music director of Bach in Baltimore and a lifelong student of Bach's music, my goal at the beginning of each cantata concert is to shine a light on the magical world of music that Bach created in each of the cantatas. In Dürr's words "to make it current." In the words of my teacher Helmuth Rilling, it is as if we were "looking over Bach's shoulder as he composed his music." To achieve that goal, before the entire work is performed, I point out some of the key examples of Word Painting or Doctrine of Affections utilized by Bach in the composition. (Word Painting is music that has a visual conception behind it. Action verbs such as turn, leap, and stray offered obvious suggestions to Bach who composed melodies designed to represent them. Doctrine of Affections was a system by which composers believed that short, repetitive musical ideas [rhythmic or melodic] could literally change a person's 'affect' – or what we today would more likely call a person's 'mood' to one of happiness, sorrow, or joy.) Of course, a complete libretto with a good English translation is also provided. Lastly, the theological









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commentary that Bach often inserts into his music, through the symbolic use of musical intervals, harmony and melodic patterns is explored and explicated prior to the complete performance of the cantata. I don't mind noting that I find this facet of Bach's cantatas to be particularly fascinating and illuminating. There are many places in Bach's music where a sophisticated commentary may be only in the purely musical form – no libretto or other hint of Bach's commentary or intentions are to be found elsewhere in the score. These are inevitably magical moments in the music; I strive to point out as many as possible within the time constraints of each individual concert.

The enjoyment, appreciation and admiration of Bach's music exists on many levels. These levels include Bach's mastery of counterpoint, his imaginative use of forms, his marvelously expressive melodies and his unsurpassed ability to elicit an emotional response from the listener. Nonetheless, to appreciate Bach just for those qualities is to miss arguably the most compelling part of it all: Bach's total embrace of the complete preoccupation of Reformationera musicians that their music "do more than entertain" (Paraphrase of Handel). Rather, they sought to construct sacred music that was open to Sermon-like interpretation that would be transformative to the listener. In my judgment, Bach succeeded in this challenging quest better than anyone in the history of music.

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
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


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### Why we need music

Adapted from an essay by Dr. Karl Paulnack, pianist & director of the music division at Boston Conservatory.

We put music in the "arts and entertainment" section of the newspaper. But music often has little to do with entertainment. Quite the opposite.

The ancient Greeks had a fascinating way of articulating how music works. In their quadrivium – geometry, arithmetic, astronomy, and music – astronomy and music are two sides of the same coin. Astronomy describes relationships between observable, external, permanent objects.

Music illuminates relationships between invisible, internal, transient objects. I imagine us having internal planets, constellations of complicated thoughts and feelings. Music finds the invisible pieces inside our hearts and souls and helps describe the position of things inside us, like a telescope that looks in rather than out.

In June 1940, French composer Olivier Messiaen was captured by the Germans and sent to a prisoner-of-war camp. There, he finished a quartet for piano, cello, violin, and clarinet, and performed it, with three other imprisoned musicians, for the inmates and guards of that camp. The piece ("Quartet for the End of Time") is arguably one of the greatest successes in the history of music.



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Given what we have since learned about life under Nazi occupation, why would anyone write music there? If you're just trying to stay alive, why bother with music? And yet - even from concentration camps themselves, we have surviving evidence of poetry, music, and visual art - many people made art. Why?

Art must be, somehow, essential for life. In fact, art is part of survival; art is part of the human spirit, an unquenchable expression of who we are; art is one of the ways in which we say, "I am alive, and my life has meaning."

On Sept. 11, 2001, I was a resident of Manhattan. Later that day I reached a new understanding of my art. Given the day's events, the idea of playing the piano seemed absurd, disrespectful, and pointless. Amid ambulances, firefighters, and fighter jets, I heard an inner voice ask: "Why am I here? What place has a musician in this moment?"

Then I saw how we survived. The first group activity in my neighborhood that night was singing. People sang. They sang around firehouses; they sang "We Shall Overcome," "America the Beautiful," "The Star-Spangled Banner"; they sang songs learned in elementary school, which some hadn't sung since then.

Within days, we gathered at Lincoln Center for the Brahms Requiem. Along with firefighters and fighter jets, artists were "first responders" in this disaster, too. The military secured our airspace, but musicians led the recovery. In measuring the revival of New York, the return of Broadway – another art form – was as significant a milestone as the reopening of the stock markets.

I now understand that music is not part of "arts and entertainment." It's not a luxury, something we fund from budget leftovers. Music is a basic need of human survival. Music is one of the ways we make sense of things, a way to express feelings when we have no words, a way to understand things with our hearts when we cannot grasp them with our minds. Music is the language we choose when we are speechless.

Imagine a graduation with absolutely no music – or a wedding, a presidential inauguration, or a service celebrating the life and death of a close friend – imagine these with no music whatsoever. What's missing – entertainment? Hardly.

What's missing is the capacity to meaningfully experience these events, as though eating great food without tasting it. Music functions as a container for experience – it augments capacity to grasp complex things. Without music, the events of our lives slip like water through cupped hands. Music increases our capacity to hold life experiences, to celebrate them, to survive them.

The performance I think of as my most important concert took place in a nursing home in a small Midwestern town. I was playing with a dear friend of mine, a violinist. We began with Aaron Copland's "Sonata," which was written during World War II and dedicated to a young pilot who was shot down during the war.

Midway through the piece, an elderly man seated in a wheelchair near the front of the concert hall began to weep. After we finished, we mentioned that the piece was dedicated

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to a downed pilot. The man became so disturbed he had to leave the auditorium, but showed up backstage afterward, tears and all, to explain himself.

He told us that during World War II, as a pilot, he was in an aerial combat situation where one of his team's planes was hit. He watched his friend bail out and his parachute open. But the Japanese planes returned and machine-gunned across the parachute chords. separating the parachute from the pilot. He then watched his friend drop away into the ocean, lost. He said he had not thought about that for years, but during that first piece of music we played, this memory returned to him so vividly that it was as though he was reliving it.

How did Copland manage to capture that picture of internal planets so clearly?

People walk into concert halls as they walk into emergency rooms, in need of healing. They may bring a broken body to a hospital, but they often bring with them to the concert a mind that is confused, a heart that is overwhelmed, a soul that is weary. Whether they go out whole again depends partly on how well musicians do their craft.

A musician is more of a paramedic than an entertainer. I'm not interested in entertaining you; I'm interested in keeping you alive. Fully alive. We're a lot like cardiac surgeons; we hold people's hearts in our hands every day. We just use different instruments.

What should we expect from young people who choose a future in music? Frankly, I expect them to save the planet.

If there is a future wave of wellness, of harmony, of peace, an end to war, mutual understanding, equality, fairness, I don't expect it to come from a government, a military force, or a corporation.

If there is a future of peace for humankind, if we are to have an understanding of how these invisible, internal things should fit together, I expect it will come from the artists, because that's what we do.

As we did in the Nazi camps and on the evening of 9/11, the artists are the ones who might be able to help us with our internal, invisible lives.



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

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


