Rachel holds degrees from Eastern Illinois University and Southern Illinois University in voice and music history.



ALLISON THORP Alto

Allison Thorp is a doctoral student in Choral Music Education at the Eastman School of Music, where she serves as the assistant conductor to the Women's Chorus and instructor of Voice Class. Previously she taught secondary choral and instrumental music in the Kentucky public school system and served as adjunct faculty at Marshall and Kentucky Christian universities. An active vocalist and collaborative pianist, Ms. Thorp currently sings in the Eastman Chorale and Schola Cantorum. She co-founded and conducts the Mount Hope World Singers, a community ensemble dedicated to performing diverse repertoire, and serves as the Director of Music at South Presbyterian Church in Rochester, New York.



DEAN EKBERG Tenor

As a singer, conductor, adjudicator, and administrator, Dean Ekberg's entire career has focused on vocal and choral music. His experience as an ensemble singer has included many choirs including frequent performances with Voices, including a performance of Bach's *Johannespassion* in this sanctuary in 2011. As a conductor, he has worked with choirs of all ages and was recognized by the Theater Association of New York State for "Excellence in Music Direction" for a recent production of *Death Takes a Holiday* presented by First Light Players. He serves as Voice Coordinator on the Adjudication Festival Committee of the New York State School Music Association, overseeing the work of over 300 adjudicators and is regularly found in all corners of New York adjudicating choirs and soloists. He continues to serve the American Choral Directors Association as a moderator and member of the ChoralNet committee. When not making music, he serves on the board of International Sister Cities of Rochester as chair of the Rochester-Würzburg Sister Cities Committee, and on the board for the Association for Teen-Age Diplomats, a group that organizes exchanges for high school students.



ADRIAN DEMIAN Concert master

Deeply musical, possessing a beautifully rich sound reminiscent of the great violin masters of the past, the Romanian born Adrian Demian began studying the violin at the age of six and made his debut as a soloist with the Arad Symphony Orchestra when he was only twelve years old. At twenty-four he became one of the youngest ever violinists to be offered a position as violin professor with the Bucharest National University of Music. Adrian Demian participated in numerous international music festivals in Romania, Canada and the U.S., as well as on tours of France, Switzerland, Spain, Turkey, and Poland. He has appeared as a soloist with several orchestras in Romania and in the U.S. In 2010 Adrian Demian started his doctoral studies at the prestigious Eastman School of Music where he is studying violin with Professor Lynn Blakeslee. Adrian became Professor Blakeslee's assistant in January 2012. He is the recipient of an Eastman Graduate Award; his teaching assistant duties including coordinating the Strings Techniques class and teaching secondary violin lessons. For more than ten years, Adrian and his wife, Neli - also a highly accomplished musician - are calling Irving, Texas, their home. Their thirteen-year old daughter, Clara Maria, is a budding pianist who wants to become a scientist.



HEE SAGONG Violin

Korean violinist Hee Sagong began her violin studies at the age of seven, and was accepted into the preparatory program at the Conservatorium van Amsterdam at the age of fifteen. She is a prizewinner at competitions including the Inter Provinciaal Concours, Prinses Christina Concours, and AMIS Internatonal Solo and Ensemble Festival, and has concertized in different regions of the Netherlands, Germany, England, and the United States. Last year, she performed at the Kennedy Center for the Conservatory Project. She also performed in the Concertgebouw last summer, where she led the NJO Symphony Orchestra as concertmaster under the baton of Etienne Siebens. Ms. Sagong holds Bachelor of Music degree with distinction from the Indiana University and Master of Music degree in Violin Performance and Literature from the Eastman School of music. In addition to her master's degree, she was awarded the prestigious Performer Certificate and the Orchestral Studies Diploma. Her major teachers include Oleh Krysa, Alexander Kerr, and Alla Kim. Currently, Ms. Sagong is pursuing Doctor of Musical Arts degree at the Eastman School of Music, where she serves as teaching assistant for Oleh Krysa.



HYERI CHOI Violin

Born in Busan, Korea, Hyeri Choi is pursuing her doctorate degree in Violin Performance and Literature at Eastman School of Music where she earned her MM degree having studied with Prof. Mikhail Kopelman since 2007. She received her Bachelor of Music from Ewha Womans University in Korea, and she earned her Orchestra Performance Certificate as a full scholarship and stipend recipient at TOHO Orchestra Academy where she had studied with Prof. Hamao Fujiwara in Japan. As a scholarship fellow, Hyeri had also internationally participated in the several summer festivals including Kirishima International Music Festival (Japan), Music Alp Festival (France), and the Music Academy of the West (USA) with renowned artists. Ms. Choi is a passionate solo, chamber, and orchestra musician. She gave a solo recital in the Musicales Concert Series at George Eastman House in 2012 and she was invited as full scholarship fellow of the 1st Albuquerque Chamber Music Festival in 2013. She had also served as the principal of the 2nd violin in the Seoul Metropolitan Youth Orchestra (SMYO) in 2005 and as a concertmaster of Eastman Graduate Chamber Orchestra and Ray Wright Jazz Studio Orchestra in Rochester, NY. She is currently an Assistant Concertmaster of the Orchestra of the Southern Finger Lakes (OSFL) in Elmira, NY.



ANGELA XING Violin

Angela Xing, violin, was a fellowship recipient at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor while pursuing her specialist degree. She obtained her masters of music from the University of Oklahoma. She also holds a bachelor degree in liberal arts and a bachelor degree in management from the Renmin University of China. Ms. Xing has worked as a violinist in the Ann Arbor Symphony Orchestra, the Oklahoma City Philharmonic Orchestra, and the orchestra of the Chinese National Opera House in Beijing.
